1. Includes entries and achievements by these pupils in previous academic years.
2. Figures for 2017/18 are provisional, figures for all other years are based on final data.
3. Attainment 8 is part of the new secondary accountability system that was implemented for all schools from 2016. Users should be cautious when comparing Attainment 8 scores between 2018, 2017 and 2016. In 2018, Attainment 8 had a maximum point score of 90, compared to a maximum of 87 to 2017, and 80 in 2016. This is as a result of the phased introduction of reformed GCSEs. This difference should be taken into account when considering any change in Attainment 8 scores between each of these years, but comparisons between areas within years are on the same basis.

4. Parliamentary constituency, local authority, region and the national figures cover achievements in state-funded schools only. They do not include pupils recently arrived from overseas and so will not match with state-funded figures in the main tables.

5. In 2015 schools could opt in to the new performance measures. 327 schools chose to do so. This data reflects the results of all schools, not just the opt-in schools. The 2015 data will, therefore, not reflect behavioural change in line with the new performance measures for the majority of schools.
